

CEO's Message

The South African agricultural sector has faced several notable challenges throughout the year, impacting farmers at all levels. One of the prominent challenges encountered by the grain sector in 2023 is adverse weather conditions. Erratic rainfall patterns, prolonged droughts, and extreme weather events have led to reduced crop yields and compromised overall agricultural productivity. These climatic uncertainties disrupted planting schedules and affected crop growth, resulting in potential food shortages and increased input costs for farmers. UFD farmers were not immune to these challenges, as most of our plantings commenced later than usual.

Additionally, the industry has grappled with rising input prices, including fertilisers, pesticides, and fuel, imposing financial pressure on farmers. Fluctuating international markets and currency exchange rates have further complicated the economic landscape for grain producers and exporters.

Addressing these challenges as a development organisation necessitated collaborative efforts from both our public and private partners, with a focus on bolstering agricultural resilience and fostering sustainable practices.

With that said, I am delighted to share the progress and achievements of Ukhanyo Farmer Development (UFD) over the past year. Our commitment to driving rural farmer development in the Eastern Cape has resulted in significant milestones and impactful initiatives, shaping a brighter future for

As part of our commitment to innovation, we have initiated groundbreaking programs to equip our mentors with cutting-edge knowledge and tools. Particularly, we have focused on empowering them with expertise in grain farming through the integration of technology. Embracing digital advancements and modern agricultural practices, our mentors are better prepared to guide farmers in maximising crop yield and guality.

Moreover, we have prioritised upskilling our farmers in good production practices, financial management, and the effective utilisation of mechanisation. Enhancing their proficiency in these critical areas ensures that our farmers optimise resources, mitigate risks, and create sustainable livelihoods for themselves and their families.

As we approached our harvesting season, our goal to achieve high yields was challenged by unusual rainfall during the winter season, leading to increased grain moisture levels. Additionally, in some of our districts, farmers' maize crops suffered significant damage from veld fires and livestock, leaving some farmers destitute without income as the new season commences. Consequently, we recognise the urgent need for crop insurance that covers hail damage, veld fires, drought, and excessive rains.



Household Grain Production Project



Our partnership with FarmSol through the Household Grain Production Project is focussed on empowering 250 subsistence farmers to successfully produce maize (yellow or white), on one - two hectares per farmer or per household. UFD's role is to facilitate co-financing partners, input suppliers, technical partners and offer farmer development support and training to these farmers for the 2022/2023 season.

JOHN DEERE S.M.A.R.T Initiative



JOHN DEERE

The John Deere S.M.A.R.T initiative has seen great success in Africa. Focused on providing farmers with the right solution for their operation, the mechanisation they need for better yields, access to finance making the un-bankable bankable, reliability at lower costs, and access to training and technology.

Through this initiative, a total of 11 qualifying farmers were selected to become the first cohort of this initiative where the programme provided farmers with the specific equipment they needed to optimise the season: tractors, off-sets, ploughs and planters to better prepare their soil for optimum yields.

This initiative is the first of its kind in the Eastern Cape and this covers Ukhanyo Farmer Development goal of assisting our farmer members with mechanisation for their production.

Our Programmes

Agricultural Bio-economy Innovation Partnership Programme



Our partnership with the Technology Innovation Agency (TIA) and DRDAR began a Canola Cultivar Evaluation Trial. The implementation of the project spanned across three District Municipalities namely, Chris Hani, Joe Gqabi and Sarah Baartman focusing on:

- Determining the grain yield performance of different cultivars in the different local municipalities of the Eastern Cape.
- Determining the number of days each cultivar takes from planting to flowering.
- Observing the incidence of pest and diseased for each cultivar.
- Determining the oil and protein content of each cultivar.

Our long term goal as Ukhanyo Farmer Development is to ensure that our farmers farm sustainably by ensuring that the farmers practise good cultivation practices which includes crop rotation and not rely only on yellow maize as a commodity. Hence such initiatives give us an opportunity to test further commodities that will work well in the Eastern Cape for farmers to farm.






Our Farmer Programme in Support of SDG Goals
